The **Honors Thesis Track** provides students a 1-to-1 mentoring experience similar to a graduate program with faculty selected by each student based on their area of inquiry. The goal of the Thesis track is to experience building knowledge through integrative and applied learning following a specific research idea, social issue to be investigated, or creative project unique to each student.

The key feature is the process of establishing a meaningful working relationship with the thesis chair in order to effectively support the student's curiosity and scholarly work, encourage interdisciplinary approaches to solving problems, and share the ongoing academic journey together.

The Innovation Track (Honors Capstone) brings honors students together to take an interdisciplinary approach at solving real-world problems within the context of an honors course. Instructors select engaging topics of interest and use an experiential learning model to guide students through structured, collaborative group research projects. Capstone course topics vary from semester to semester.

What is Honors Thesis? - Determining Project/Research Types - Step 1

Individual-based or Team-based Project?

STEP 1

Project Setting—are you starting from scratch or creating a thesis project within an existing research lab/team/ program which you belong to?

*Note: Finding a thesis chair and research lab opportunities can take time—start early!

Individual Project

This is mainly for students who are interested in developing their own themes and projects. You will come up with general project ideas and then look for a thesis chair based on your ideas and interests.

*Tips: Start with faculty you know and feel comfortable talking with. For Interdisciplinary Study ideas, you can also talk with Honors faculty!

*Note: Be flexible with the theme/ project ideas as you may not find a thesis chair whose field and experiences perfectly match with what you want to do! Team-based Project

Examples:

- Science Labs
- Psychology Labs
- Engineering Labs

This is for students who are already in an existing research lab/team/ program. You may utilize the research that the team is currently working on and identify your specific tasks within it, or create a new sub-project which is not part of their major work, but still helpful to the team. One of the team members should become your thesis chair and help you identify the scope of work specific to your thesis.

*Note: Your work/tasks (2-semester worth) must be clearly defined so that your thesis chair can grade your work each semester!

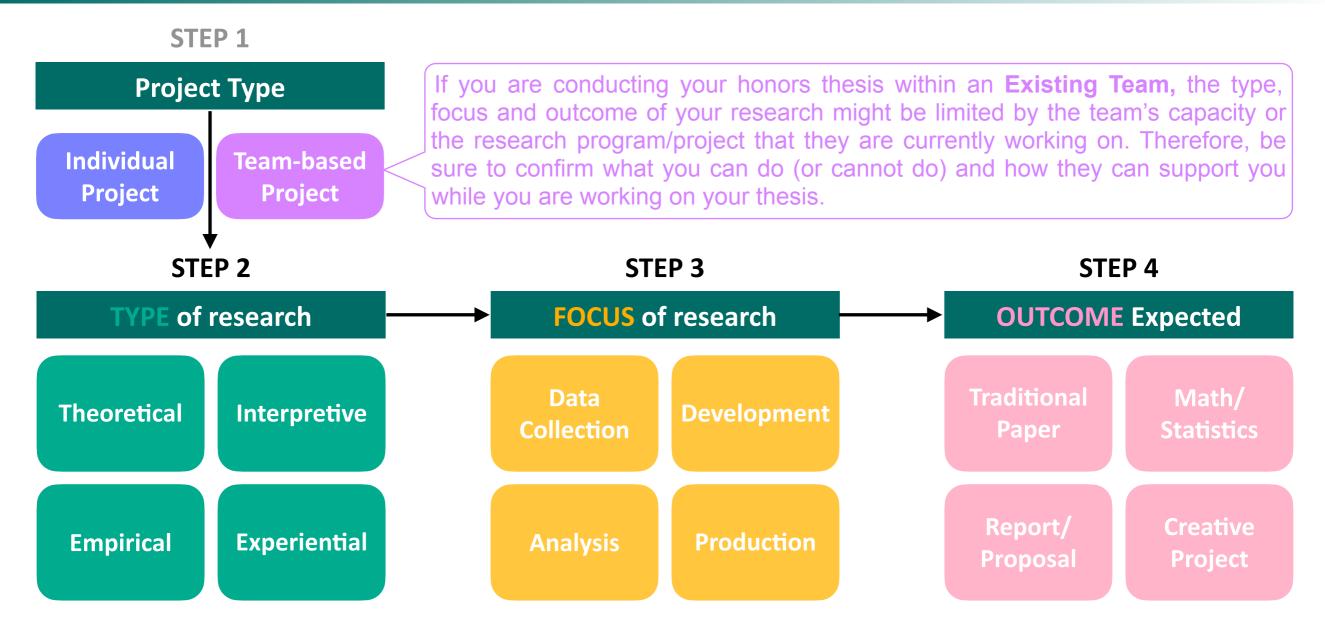

Now that you have determined your project type, consider what kind of research you would like to do or experience. These categories are also useful to determine the skills and specialities that you would learn from your thesis chair.

A research process can be very long. Therefore, you may have to focus on a certain area. For example, if you focus on collecting data, you may not have a lot of time to analyze and synthesize the data. Of course, there should be a process—even if you focus on collecting data, you still need to organize the data and produce a report (or some sort) to present your findings in a meaningful way. Therefore, discussing the scope of work and expected outcomes with your prospective chairs is critical. Your thesis chair should be able to support both the overall process and each step listed here.
